PROBLEM IDENTIFICATION

Substance-impaired drivers contributed to 22.9 percent of Missouri's traffic crash fatalities during the past five years. Alcohol remains the primary contributor to substance-impaired driving crashes; however, the number of persons under the influence of prescription medications and/or illicit drugs continues to increase. Male drivers were more likely than females to be involved in substance-impaired driving crashes. During the past five years, males were responsible for 80.4 percent of substance-impaired driving fatalities. Fourteen percent of the children less than 15 years of age, who were killed in motor vehicle crashes over the last five years, were riding with a substance-impaired driver who often was an underage-impaired driver.

From 2017 to 2019 the Independence Missouri Police Department investigated 6,759 crashes. It was determined that alcohol impairment was involved in 394 of these crashes which resulted in 8 fatalities and 40 reported disabling injuries sustained.

The following shows where Independence ranks compared to other cities in Missouri for impaired fatalities and serious injury crashes:

The top four crash locations in Independence are MO-291 from Hidden Valley to Salisbury, Noland Road from MO-78 to 39th Street, and Sterling and Mo-78, and Sterling at US 40.

GOALS/OBJECTIVES

Core Performance Measure Goals

1. Based on an annual average increase of 3.41 percent in alcohol-impaired driving involved fatalities from 2014 to 2018, Missouri is projecting a five-year average of 251.5 alcohol-impaired driving involved fatalities of 251.5 by December 31, 2021.

Participate in the National Impaired Driving Crackdown campaigns

Participate in the quarterly impaired driving enforcement campaigns

Develop and implement a high visibility DWI enforcement plan involving saturation patrols and other approved methods.

Conduct Youth Alcohol Enforcement consisting of compliance checks, surveillance and follow-up visits.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Three to five officers and one supervisor will be assigned to each wolfpack project in areas where DWI arrests have been made and where alcohol related crashes have occurred. This operation will be scheduled year round on Friday and Saturday nights from 9:00 p.m. to 3:00 a.m. and also targeting holidays when the occurrence of alcohol related crashes increase. Additionally, monthly waves of enforcement will be conducted. The times will vary from 4:00 p.m. to 5:00 a.m. any day of the week. These waves will supplement the weekend wolf packs by officers working individually or in smaller teams so that additional DWI enforcement can be conducted throughout the week. Although these waves will be less intense than the weekend wolfpacks it will allow us to fill in gaps where there was no DWI enforcement coverage during the week. With the popularity of weeknight pool, bowling, poker and other entertainment activities associated with the consumption of alcohol these additional waves of enforcement will be beneficial to our goal of continuing to reduce alcohol related crashes. Large-scale Wolfpacks will be employed approximately twelve times a year. They will consist of ten to thirty officers with two supervisors conducting saturation patrol in a determined location with a BAT van deployed for processing impaired drivers. These efforts will be accompanied by press releases advising the impending enforcement and results similar to the informational aspects of sobriety checkpoints of the past.

US24, I-70, MO-12 (Truman Road), MO-291, MO-78(23rd Street), Noland Road, Lee's Summit Road, Sterling Ave, and US-40 top the list of alcohol related crashes and will be the primary focus of DWI enforcement operations.

Underage confidential informants (C.I.'s) supervised by police officers will be used to conduct approximately twelve liquor compliance checks a year. The goal is to conduct two to four compliance checks a year at each of the 180 licensed liquor establishments throughout the city. Additional follow-up compliance checks will be attempted for establishments with reported violations. Additional compliance checks, surveillance, and follow-ups will be conducted as funds and staffing allow.

Four to twelve officers and one supervisor working in teams of two will take part in these compliance checks. Each team will have one or two C.I.'s assigned to them. Each operation will be scheduled for 6-8 hours, depending on the number of violations. These operations will be scheduled year round with special focus on weekends, holidays, prom, homecomings, and graduations.

The goal of conducting liquor compliance checks is to reduce the availability of alcohol sales to juveniles in our community.

Implementation of the Cops in Shops program will place plainclothes officers in retail alcohol outlets posing as store clerks or employees in a collaborative effort to prevent illegal underage alcohol purchases and to prevent adults from purchasing alcohol for minors. Preliminary communication with retailers indicates nearly half of all Independence package liquor establishments wish to participate in this voluntary program.
