Parks Improvement Sales Tax Program Report July 1, 2023 – December 31, 2023



Mission and Membership

The Independence Park Commission was established by Ordinance in 1999. The Commission's primary mission is to act in an advisory capacity to the City Council relating to public education, use, and knowledge regarding Parks and Recreation activities. The Commission also serves as the official Parks and Recreation Sales Tax Oversight Committee.

The Park Commission is comprised of seven voting members appointed by the City Council. Current members include Chair Diane Kyser, Kay Douglas, Jana Evans, Paula Martin, Cody Steger, and Dennis Tharp with one vacancy.

Sales Tax Review

Independence voters renewed the current Parks Improvement Sales Tax (PRST) in perpetuity in August of 2010. It is dedicated to fund on-going park maintenance, certain facility operations, recreation programming and various parks and recreation related capital projects. Through December 31, 2023, the tax generated \$2,478,310, or 47%, of the PRST revenue for fiscal year 2023-24.

Park Projects, Revitalization & Operations

Parks, Facilities and Grounds maintenance staff worked on a variety of projects during fall and winter months.

- Preparations for July 4th Celebration twice as the first date closed early due to weather
- Set up/take down for 1849 Main Street facades, stage, fire extinguishers, fans, supplies
- Disassembled NFTM exhibits, loaded, transported, unloaded, and reassembled them in the new space, ensuring the artifacts were handled properly and not damaged during the transition
- Hill Park Painted the skate park
- Waterfall Park Repaired playground surface, sealed parking lot & winterized the waterfall feature
- Blackburn Park Installed new wind screens on the pickleball court
- All parks Winterized restrooms and irrigation systems
- Parks and trails Cleared and removed brush
- Adventure Oasis Power washed lazy river, cleaned up landscaping and trimmed trees, winterized pools and both spraygrounds
- George Owens Nature Park Set up Enchanted Forest light display on Speck Road, prepared trailers and drove tractors during the event
- Training Trained new employees to pass CDL exam for snow removal
- Equipment maintenance Prepared trucks and equipment for snow removal operations
- Facility maintenance Oversaw custodial and maintenance work for all city buildings
- MO Model Railroad Museum Oversaw roof, HVAC, siding and flooring repairs
- Park maintenance facility Installed new fencing to secure equipment and facility
- Homeless Cleanups 21 camps cleaned up and removed
- Graffiti and vandalism Daily removal and repair
- Woodlawn Cemetery 60% complete repaving streets and repairing curbs w/Municipal Services
 456 wreaths placed in Wreaths Across America program
 Purchased new backhoe to replace a 27-year-old piece of equipment

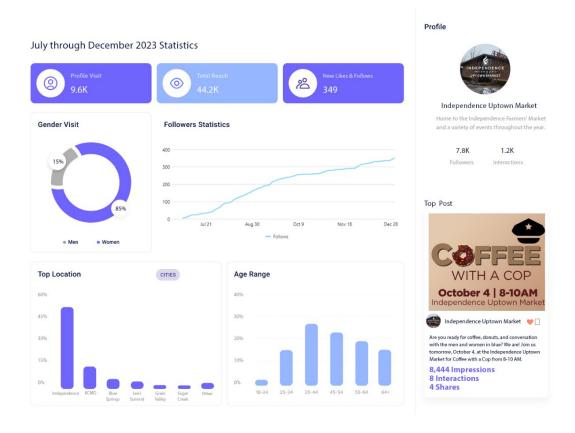


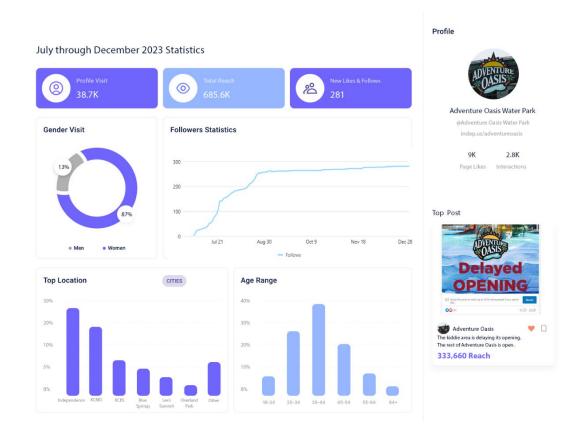


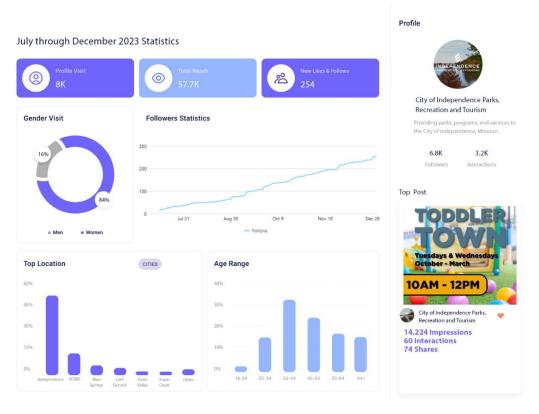
Social Media

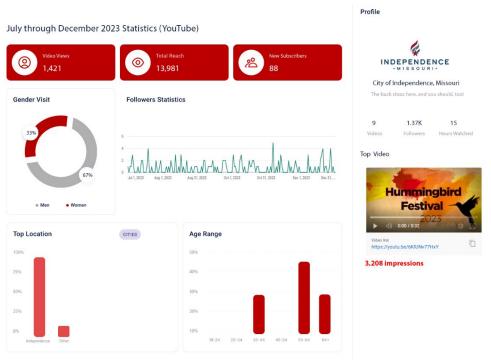

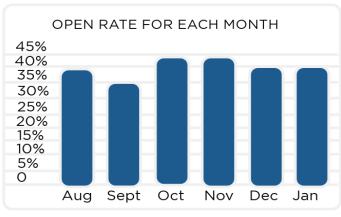

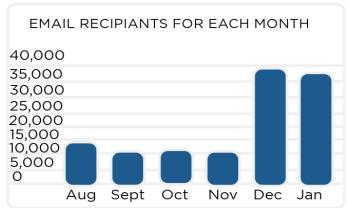
The Communications Team and PRT staff created a digital newsletter to inform the public of upcoming events and activities. This monthly newsletter goes straight to recipients' email. Content includes registration tips for WebTrac, an opening highlight featuring our Visit Independence blog, press releases or other interesting highlights about PRT-related news, and helpful tips about weather.

The mailings score shares performance based on a 10-point scale. This scale compares our publications to the national average of over 45,000 customers and millions of emails. Open rate shares the percentage of our mailings that are opened by the recipients. The recipients graph shares how many community members receive our monthly newsletter.

July through December 2023 Statisticis (PRT Newsletter)





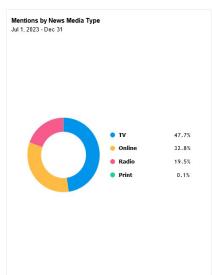


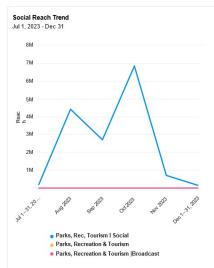


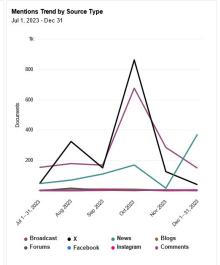

Included in the summary of data are how the content is viewed by the public, whether it is positive, negative, or neutral in sentiment for the content.

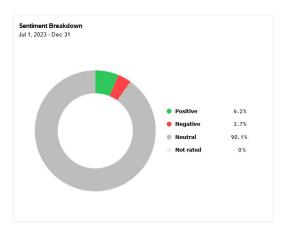
How does the earned media break down?

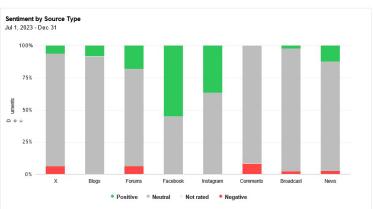






How favorable is the content?
